Christian Formation Opportunities

During September many of our Christian formation opportunities begin meeting again after a summer hiatus. Here are some classes and groups in which you can participate:

Sunday Morning, September 10 @ 9:00am

The Fellowship Hall Adult class is continuing with DVD presentations by Phillip Cary, director of the philosophy program at Eastern University. In recognition of the 500th anniversary of the reformation this series, titled *LUTHER: Gospel, Law, and Reformation*, explores the deep inner struggle of conscience which prompted the Reformation. Our next presentations look at how Luther viewed topics such as predestination, the Bible and Erasmus' works.

The BRP is happy to inform the community that our first family from Syria have begun the process of applying for a Green Card!!! But there are still many other struggles for all of our families. School is a challenge for many of our children. ESL is not so easy when you cannot read or write your own language. This is true for four of our six families. Each family has someone with major mental and/ or dental issues. Most of these are covered by insurance. Unfortunately, the adults are not covered for dental; most of our major dental issues are with the adults. We have one adult who needs complete replacement of upper teeth. Donations for this would be greatly appreciated.

All families are in need of the transportation to and from the many appointments. There is a need for childcare for toddlers while their parents attend ESL classes. (You will need a background check which the BRP can facilitate). There still remains a need for drivers for a 3 year old to go to and from Head Start. To sign up go to the following link:

Re+Formed People

How do we make spiritual sense of the Reformation on college campuses 500 years after Luther's 95 Theses ignited this revolutionary movement? There's some similarity between our times across that half millennium. The Reformation spread like wildfire largely due to the printing press, a proto social media tool that shared information far more personally and much faster than previous generations could expect. Today, digital social media turned that fire into a blaze of data. Luther arose at a time where distrust of the church was growing, though church participation remained high. In our context, the distrust of spiritual authority has led to a decline in church participation, though not in the general population's spiritual interest.

At The Well this fall, we will commemorate the 500th anniversary of the Reformation by exploring the ways that God's formed us and continues to reform us for Christ-like life in the world. We will worship God and together study, serve, and celebrate the identities that God's given to us before and grows in us still. This includes reflection upon the ways that we've been malformed, not by God, but by false images of God that we've built. It also requires an exploration into the ways that the church was were formed for service in a world that no longer exists, which requires intentional discernment on what traditions might feel comfortable to us but no longer serve the needs of God's world or God's people. As we give thanks for our Lutheran tradition and reaffirm our identities gathered around the centrality of Christ and the beauty of grace that we discover most clearly in the Bible, we'll also include guest speakers from other faith traditions, both ecumenical and interreligious partners, to help us explore God's dynamic presence in others.

On a personal level, I'm thankful to again be working with The Well at Virginia Tech. Not only am I still passionate about campus ministry; I'm also blessed by the relationships built with students last semester. It's a privilege to be a part of God's work on campus and through LMLC. If you'd like to get more involved with The Well or to explore new ways we can make a positive impact at VT, please let me know! I'd love to brainstorm and develop initiatives with you.

A great big THANK YOU to the members of Luther Memorial who, over the summer, were amazingly generous in their support of the Social Ministry Committee's annual backpack and school supply drive. This drive supports the Salvation Army and the work they do to get ALL children ready for the first day of school.

This year, we hit a milestone! We could not get all the school supplies and the backpacks into one car. It took two trips to Target to make our purchases, using the over \$1000 dollars donated by the congregation. Then it took two trips to the Salvation Army to make our delivery of the purchased and donated backpacks and supplies.

It was gratifying to arrive at the Salvation Army with these school supplies and be greeted with enthusiasm, and statements like: "We hoped you would be coming again this year!" and "You all are an answer to a prayer!" The Salvation Army has a large number of applications from families in our community with children in need of school supplies. The demand is not decreasing and this means always trying to find ways to make what they have go just a little bit further. There is no doubt, our donations have certainly bolstered their ability to meet the needs of as many families as possible!

We think of the school supply drive as a summer project, but it really isn't one that is limited to those weeks in July and August before everyone heads back to school. The folks at the Salvation Army let us know that they get requests from families throughout the school year who need to replenish their children's school supplies. However, the stock of supplies quickly runs low and the Salvation Army is limited in how many additional requests they can fill.

So, if this is a project that calls out to you, consider making a donation of school supplies at other times during the school year. If your own child needs more pencils or notebook paper in October or February, chances are so do other kids in our community. So when you head to the store to replenish your child's supplies, pick up a few extra of each item and donate those to the Salvation Army! It's a little way to make a big difference for a child in our community!

Supporting the Women's Resource of the New River Valley



Here we are into the month of September! What a great month as many enjoy the days that lead from summer into fall, football games and the new beginnings promised by the 2017-2018 academic year. It's such a happy time, right? For many people in the New River Valley, these days can be a continuance of needing a safe place from abuse. The Women's Resource Center of the New River Valley is our Change for Change Recipient for the month of September. Their mission is to create a community free of domestic and sexual violence. Their guiding principles include safety, dignity, respect, empowerment, free services, community collaboration and freedom from violence.

Nearly one-third of American women will experience intimate partner violence (IPV). As the leading cause of female homicides and injury-related deaths during pregnancy, IPV also accounts for a significant proportion of injuries and emergency room visits for women. Looking beyond the immediate and often severe health consequences of IPV, a growing body of research has linked IPV to many chronic health problems.

Throughout the year, many organizations and individuals ask about the needs of the children and adults served by the Women's Resource Center of the New River Valley. During a recent conversation with one of the staff members, it was revealed that the Women's Resource Center often provides transportation to the hospital, transportation to a safe place, funds for utilities for a non-residential client who struggles to pay a utility bill or purchase groceries for children.

As we welcome autumn's beauty, let us each be mindful of the extraordinary work accomplished by the Women's Resource Center. For over 30 years, they have been providing hope and help to those who need it in the New River Valley. Let's help them continue to be a safe place for people in our community. Please consider supporting them as our September Change for Change recipient. You can help make a difference for children and adults who rely on this vital service as they escape the ravages of intimate partner violence and domestic violence.
